
#### Dr. C. Rex Mix

This year brought the unfortunate death of the beloved Dr. C. Rex Mix. Considered to be an inspirational role model, as well as loving father and friend, Dr. C. Rex Mix's death sorrowed the Lynchburg Community. With his memory in mind we are able to look past this tragedy and concentrate on the dreams that Dr. C. Rex Mix had instilled in so many of us.

Dr. C. Rex Mix was born in Greenville, Texas he earned his undergraduate and master's degrees from Texas Christian University. He went on to receive his doctorate from the University of Denver. He joined the Lynchburg College family in 1978 as an associate professor of communication. In 1988 he was named as a full professor in the Communications Department. He was appointed Interim Chaplain of the college in 1992 and later appointed full time Lynchburg College Chaplain in 1993.

Many numerous activities throughout the community were also part of Dr. Mix's accomplishments. Dr. Mix was active withing the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) at regional and national levels. He authored and edited several books and articles. His voice was a pleasure for many when heard in various college musical and community performances. He was a member of several honorary associations, but always held his family, friends and students as his first priority. Dr. C. Rex Mix was able to bring joy to all who knew him through his genuine zest for life. He brought many changes to our college where he stood as a leader for nearly two decades. Through bringing church conferences and ministerial training sessions to the campus, beginning programs such as the Service Learning Program, and bringing a genuine campassion to all, Dr. Mix has touched many. He answered his call to Lynchburg College, and in turn made Lynchburg College a richer community. It is upon considereing his dedication and love for Lynchburg College that we proudly dedicate the 1998 Argonaut to Dr. C. Rex Mix. May his memory live forever, and the posotive changes he brought be honored and upheld.




# **Spring Fling**
















